Nancy Kissel Selected for National 4-H Hall of Fame!

Nancy Kissel, a Wisconsin 4-H volunteer with more than sixty-five years of service has been selected to be inducted into the National 4-H Hall of Fame. Kissel will be Wisconsin's first volunteer selected for this honor.

Kissel started a 4-H community club, serving as 4-H general leader for 35 years, and many more years as 4-H project leader. Her expansive 4-H volunteer contributions include roles at the county, state, and national levels. Kissel credits her 1970's part-time position as an urban expansion 4-H Staff Assistant, developing programs and organizing 4-H clubs for



under served urban and minority populations, with further developing her leadership skills. Donna Menart nominated Kissel for the national honor. She says Kissel's character is evident in everything she does. "She lives the ideals of 4-H. Her contributions as a volunteer are impressive in longevity, but even more so in terms of the quality and depth of her ability to create sustaining systems that support the educational mission of 4-H on all levels," says Menart. "Her contributions have benefitted untold numbers of 4-H youth and adults."

"I am beyond thrilled to have a Wisconsin volunteer selected for the National Hall of Fame," says Kandi O'Neil, WI Volunteer Leadership Specialist." When I think of Nancy's impact on Wisconsin 4-H, I think of the horse project. As a volunteer, Nancy saw interested young people who wanted to learn about horses and may not be able to own a horse. By creating the Horseless Horse project, she was able to offer an opportunity for youth not only in Wisconsin but throughout the nation to learn about horses." Nancy served on the writing team for the national curriculum for Horseless Horse. State volunteer leadership roles have included: member of the WI State Horse Council, past president of the WI 4-H Horse Association and past director of the Midwest Horse Fair.

Nancy's contributions as a volunteer are evident in the quality of educational programs for Wisconsin youth across the state. Her vision of finding a "yes" to what could have easily been a no has impacted untold numbers of youth across the country to be able to learn about horses.

Governor Dodge Equestrian Campground – It's Really Happening!

The Friends of Governor Dodge State Park are happy to share some truly great news. Thanks the persistent efforts of the Friends Equestrian committee and the amazingly generous support of hundreds of individuals, groups, and businesses, a beautiful new 20-site equestrian campground at Governor Dodge State Park is nearly complete.

The dream of a spacious, modern equestrian campground began long ago with the park's 1984 Master Plan and a "temporary" campground on a small asphalt parking lot in the park's busy core. When funding for the project failed to materialize after more than 3 decades, the Friends stepped up in 2015 to plan for a facility more on a par with other state parks and in keeping with the beauty of Governor Dodge. The Friends first-ever fundraising campaign was launched in 2018. Now, just 3 short years later, over half a million dollars has been raised, and the dream is at long last becoming a reality!

The basic campground infrastructure has been built. Electricity, the most requested and costly campground amenity, is in place for 18 of 20 sites. As of August, the Friends were within \$50,000 of the fundraising goal of \$550,000. But after 3 years of planning fundraiser rides, creating flyers and slogans, soliciting items for auctions and raffles, writing grant applications and press releases, AND (hardest of all) repeatedly asking our personal friends to donate to the cause, committee members were nearing the brink of "FUNDRAISING BURNOUT." Then, just in the nick of time, yet another horse and park lover came to the rescue...offering a \$25,000 match grant! We are stunned and beyond grateful to have received this THIRD challenge match offer. Suddenly our \$50,000 goal has been cut by half!

The Rock County Multi Use Trails Group has been partnering with the Jefferson County Fair to help parking cars during fair week. Our group began performing this service four years ago, taking over from the Hags on Nags group. The Jefferson County Fair uses about 500 volunteers from non-profit groups to keep the fair running smoothly.

We have 4 or 5 people on horseback flagging cars, helping fair goers find parking spots, and directing traffic. We also patrol the parking lot both as goodwill ambassadors, and keep an eye on things during the week. 
one of their top days ever, and boy were we busy!



Members and District 2 Officers decided it was important to reach families that may be new in the horse industry or those just considering horses as a hobby.

The Rodeo City Riders performed and added to the excitement. The Rodeo City Riders also gave a clinic with the kids asking lots of questions. Langlade County Horse and Pony Project gave a safety demonstration. Forest County Horse & Pony Club donated the crafts and worked all day with the kids to have a new skill with leather necklaces. Purina and Antigo Country Store supplied prizes on the Black Hawk Hill Kids Prize Wheel.

Fleet Farm supplied coupons and District 2 members gave a demonstration on body conditioning scoring and weighing your horse as well as what feed tags tell you. Several other demonstrations included why we test our horse pastures with soil testing kits furnished by VAS Laboratories. The scavenger hunt was as much fun for the parents as the kids. A roping demonstration wrapped up the day. Throughout the day we had about 30 families participate. Members were on hand to answer questions about selecting horses and where to get help with training.

A lot of information on trail riding and horse shows was distributed, and overall the day was a great success. We are hoping to add another WHC District 2 Education Day location next year to our Youth Equine Education and Fun Day.

Wisconsin Large Animal Emergency Response Partners with the Friends of Madison Mounted Horse Patrol to Hold Animal Rescue Techniques Clinic

Knowing how to properly rescue a large animal will do more than save the animal; that knowledge can also protect those trying to help it. To teach appropriate skills for handling such situations, the Wisconsin Large Animal Emergency Response partnered with the Friends of Madison Mounted Horse Patrol to hold a large animal rescue techniques clinic June 13, at The Horse First Farm.

"A lot can be learned in a full-day clinic," said city of Madison police officer Sarah Mulry and Friends member. "The clinic was open to the public; there were a few first responders, horse and dairy owners and a veterinarian who attended. The clinic focused on how to conduct large animal rescue maneuvers safely, so that was the reason many attended as this type of course is not offered very often unless you travel out of state to other national courses."

Clinic organizer Mulry says the clinic not only teaches participants how to properly rescue a large animal, it emphasizes safety for the rescuers. She remarked many livestock owners, in particular horse owners, want to jump in the trailer because of their connection with their animals.

"They think, 'That's my baby,'" said Mulry, "but when humans intervene, they can get hurt. People are put at risk all the time. We always want to keep people safe. The best thing is to give the owners tasks."

In addition to a two-hour classroom session, the 30 clinic participants received hands-on work with a 1,000 pound horse mannequin, a livestock trailer that can be tipped on its side and other emergency equipment.

Clinic presenter Dr. Howard Ketover, DVM, covered scenarios dealing with a downed horse in a trailer, freeing trapped animals and containing loose animals using hazard tape. The instruction included assessing the scene and determining what the animal can communicate about its situation.

"We have to look at what the animal is trying to tell us," said Ketover.

Clinic participants also learned how to use equipment that's generally on hand. Those handling livestock tend to use large agricultural equipment in their rescue attempts. However, if the equipment isn't used correctly, the animal might be freed but could then succumb to injuries incurred during the rescue.

"Large animals can be handled with the tools on hand," said Ketover. "You just have to know how to use them."

The idea for providing training in large animal rescue began in 2006 when Ketover realized such techniques were lacking in the veterinary and livestock communities.

"There's little education in the methods taught in veterinary schools," said Ketover. "So, I went to other clinics to learn how to help large animals."

With the training he received, Ketover and fellow board members started WLAER in 2012 with the mission of teaching veterinarians, first responders and animal owners how to safely conduct rescues.

The clinic was a fundraiser for WLAER and the city of Madison Mounted Police Unit. Funds raised from this first-time collaboration are split between WLAER and the Friends group.

The city's official mounted unit receives support from the Friends group which raises money to supplement city funds to operate the unit. The Madison Mounted Police Unit has three members already trained in large animal rescue and two are in training.

Started in 1986 by six Madison police officers, the Madison Mounted Police Team was initially an unofficial group. They first rode their personal horses while in uniform in the city's annual Holiday Parade. With overwhelming approval from the community, the team began training with their horses for on-duty police work, and in 1988, became certified with the National Mounted Officer Training Association.

Budget cuts resulted in the unit becoming disbanded, but it was resurrected in 2007 as the Madison Police Mounted Patrol Unit. The officers assumed most of the costs for equipment and care of the horses. To assist the officers, the nonprofit Friends group was formed to help the mounted patrol officers with expenses. Currently, the unit has two full-time and four part-time officers and six horses.

The History of the Wisconsin Horse Council

Part 8 of 10

The Council is concerned about the lack of effective laws regulating humane treatment of horses. The Board agrees that the major goal of the WHC should be to improve the humane treatment of animals through education and legislative action.

Ray Antoniewicz attends the WI Agri-Business Council Meeting, January 3-4. In an effort to defend against animal rights group's propaganda, this council has published a coloring book that is presented to all 4th grade school students in Wisconsin.

The Governor's Conference on Tourism is February 13-15 at Stevens Point. LaVonne Williamson, Judy Larson and Wayne Schutte represent WHC. Many contacts are made. The equine industry has become very visible at the tourism conference and a visible part of the State's tourism industry.

One of the contacts made there is Jeff Shultz, site director of the Wade House. Together, we formulate plans to co-sponsor a Horse and Buggy Exposition at the Wade House June 16 & 17. The exposition is a success with over 1,100 spectators and participants. The WHC donates \$100 to help finance the project. Land is cleared for camping and an arena is built. The Wade house is a historical site of 280 acres. This facility could connect up with the Northern Kettle Moraine State Park.

The WHC donates money to many groups this year. The State 4-H receives \$600. The first annual Future Farmers of America (FFA) State Horse Show receives a \$20 donation/sponsorship of a class. The Wisconsin High School Rodeo gets \$300 to help finance their trip to the Nationals in OK. A donation of \$100 is made to the Morris Animal Foundation to be used for animal research.

The Trail Committee recommends donations to several trail projects throughout the state. The Chequamegon Second Challenge Grant is awarded \$500, the Ahnapee Trail gets \$250 and the Black River Horse Camp also gets \$250.

The Trail Committee proposes a WHC Trails Policy. The policy is approved in June: 'To act as the equestrian liaison between local "friends of the trail' groups and local, state and federal government agencies; to assist and promote acquisitions and development of silent-use trails and support multi-use trails where compatible; to investigate and pursue legislation affecting trails.' This statement is meant as a reference to what the WHC believes and strives to do in regard to trail development.

The Trail Committee is very active this year. Josie Piper meets with the National Resources Board of Directors on January 24. Here she submits a request that horses be allowed to use access and park maintenance roads in selected wildlife properties. In August, Josie wrote a letter of intent asking for the inclusion of horse trails on the master plans for the Yellowstone Lake State Park and the Boise-Cascade State Park. The Council is informed in September that efforts are underway to change the Administrative code NR45, which states that horses are not allowed on game management properties.

Betty Bob attends a hearing February 22 concerning the Winnebago Recreational Trail. All terrain vehicles (ATV) are trying to gain access, which is denied because of public opinion. Betty states that the WHC supports multi-usage of trails but only when it's compatible.

A new Trails Guide is published in 1990, through the efforts of Betty Bob and Josie Piper. Sue Piper sends copies to all of the State libraries.

The opening of the Ahnopee Trail is held May 5 and is a great success, with 110 riders.

The Grand Opening of the Glacial Drumlin Trail is June 14. Interference by a bicycle group and an environmental group forces the DNR to declare a moratorium on all horse trail projects in Wisconsin. Equestrians are urged to act now before the gains of recent years in trail development are lost. The Glacial Drumlin Trail Association organizes a rally to the Capital in Madison on October 20. Press releases are planned and a WI Horse Industry survey is circulated. The results will be used to strengthen our position at the rally.

The Lake States Resource Alliance meets in Wausau in August. This group is fighting to keep the Nicolet National Forest open to recreational use. The WHC joins the alliance for \$250 and sends Dave Dewey as its representative.

Seventy Seven riders attend the second Western District meeting on May 12 in conjunction with the Grand Opening Ride at Black River State Forest Horse Camp.

The WHC has written in support of the National Recreation Trail Fund Act sponsored by Senator Symms. This bill would provide between 50-60 million dollars that would come from the highway Trust Fund.

The Judges Seminar is held march 17 with over 200 in attendance. Dan Burke and Carol Alm are guest lecturers. The seminar goes from a 2 day to a 1 day, making it more affordable to the public. A new fast copy list of acceptable judges will be made, a valuable service to state horse-people who are selecting horse show judges.

Horseperson –of-the-year is Art Bast. In August, Esther Schwartz takes over chairmanship of the committee from Fran Grandlic.

Scholarship recipients for 1990 are Jessica Cole, \$500; Carolyn Robb, \$250 and Ann Wright, \$250. The Council votes to raise the scholarship amounts to \$1000, \$500 and \$250 respectively in December.

The Midwest Horse Fair, held April 21-23 is a huge success with attendance in excess of 25,000. This year the emphasis is on youth with the Midwest/American Youth Horse Council Meeting held in conjunction with the Fair. Several awards are presented and the Secretary of Agriculture is in attendance. An extended liaison committee for the Fair meets September 14 in Beaver Dam to plan the 1991 Fair.
