#### Call to Action to support "The Old Guard"

(Washington, D.C., June 10, 2022): Several weeks ago, the American Horse Council was made aware of some concerns regarding the conditions of the facilities housing the soldiers and horses of The Old Guard at Arlington Cemetery. The 3d U.S. Infantry, traditionally known as "The Old Guard," is the oldest active-duty infantry unit in the Army, serving our nation since 1784. The Old Guard is the Army's official ceremonial unit and escort to the president, and it also provides security for Washington, D.C., in time of national emergency or civil disturbance.

The concerns were highlighted in an CNN article dated April 7, 2022, which stated that "The military horses that carry America's heroes to their final resting place in Arlington National Cemetery are living in unsanitary and potentially life-threatening conditions, according to a US Army report reviewed exclusively by CNN, consuming poor-quality feed, suffering from parasites and standing in their own excrement in tiny mud lots scattered with gravel and construction waste." The 60-plus horses of the Old Guard are rotated between two facilities in northern Virginia: a stable facility with three paddocks nestled in the Army base at Fort Myer, barely 2 miles outside Washington, and a 6-acre pasture complex at Fort Belvoir, an Army base about 30 minutes outside the city.

To obtain additional information and determine what actions may be needed, AHC staff spoke with The Old Guard leadership; 1LT Carlin Keally, US Army Caisson Platoon Leader, and Major Shahin Uddin, Director of Communications with The Old Guard. They indicated the matter had been addressed and a "detailed and systematic approach to improving the facilities and processes surrounding the care of the horses" has been developed, including the allocation of additional \$2M in funds for the improvements. We offered both officers our continued support should they need anything to help them bring these improvements to fruition.

More recently we understand that funding has been held up in the Department of Defense. AHC is urging the equine community to write/call your congressional members to express you support for The Old Guard and encourage them to expediate the funding.

It has been AHC's honor and privilege to work in partnership with The Old Guard on several community outreach projects over the years, and we are happy to provide them our assistance.

The Wisconsin Horse Council, with Recreational Trails Program grant funding provided by the DNR, sponsored the 15th Trail Design Certification School at Hartman Creek State Park. Thirteen trail supporters attended the four-day class and learned how to correct existing trail problems and create new sustainable trails guided by Mike Riter.

Mike Riter, the owner of Trail Design Specialists, believes in leaving nature's aesthetics intact while simultaneously creating safe, durable, and sustainable horse, mountain bike, hiking, and multi-use trails.

Trail Design Specialists' Trail Master Certification Class covers the latest advances in trail design, construction, and maintenance, focusing on long-term sustainability and ease of care. The course also covers complex topics, including handling user conflicts, correct layout of a trail, avoiding erosion and other environmental issues, proper construction techniques, rehabilitating existing routes, and other topics. The course included both classroom learning and hands-on practical trail experience.





Sunday May 15, 2022. provided beautiful weather for the first WRHA Youth Only Ranch Show/Clinic. While our ranch shows have exploded in size, we have always been lacking in youth riders. The idea of hosting a youth only ranch type show came to mind. Something that would introduce kids to ranch classes and hopefully grow their interest in exhibiting with our club.

While we advertised it as a horse show, it really became a hybrid show/clinic combo. We wanted these young riders to have the fun you get from competing but with some one-on-one attention.

We had trained professionals on-hand to give a demonstration of each class and answer any questions. After the demo the kids entered the ring and were judged per the ARHA (American Ranch Horse Association) rulebook.

Dan Grunewald was our judge/clinician that day. I will say that when you put Dan and kids together, you have a win-win situation. Anyone that needed individual attention got it. Most of the classes were pattern classes, something many of these



kids were not familiar or comfortable with. Dan walked them thru the patterns and let several kids repeat maneuvers if they were having some problems.



We had 19 riders attend (with the youngest being 7 years of age), so a good turnout. Seemed like everyone had a good time and hopefully gained some knowledge about ranch shows. While our goal is to grow our youth membership in WRHA, it is equally important to keep kids interested in horses. No matter if they do trail riding, horse shows, gymkhana,

or just want a horse to love on. These kids are the future of the equine industry

# New 20 - Site Equestrian Campground Now Open at Governor Dodge State Park



On Friday, April 29th, an enthusiastic crowd of horse and park lovers, State officials and dignitaries gathered to witness the official ribbon cutting at the long-awaited equestrian campground at Governor Dodge State Park. The event marked the culmination of 7 years of intensive planning and fundraising on the part of the Friends of Governor Dodge State Park, and fulfilled an element of the park's 1984 Master Plan to build a "20 site 80 occupant horse campground" at this location on the park's peaceful and scenic north side. Led by the

Friend's Equestrian committee, over \$625,000 was raised since June of 2018 to fund the project. Hundreds of individuals, horse groups, foundations and businesses from across Wisconsin and beyond pitched in to donate money, award grant funds, provide event sponsorships and in-kind donations, buy raffle tickets and trail passes and attend fundraisers to make this vision a reality.

The new campground features spacious level easy entry sites designed to accommodate today's large living quarters horse trailers and offers desired amenities such as electric service at 18 sites. A fully ADA accessible campsite, made possible by a grant from the Friends of Wisconsin State Parks, ensures that riders or their family members with mobility challenges will not be left behind. A centrally located group gathering area with fire ring and patio



was made possible by a generous donation from Kathy Gruentzel, a Dodgeville resident and recently retired long-time superintendent of Governor Dodge State Park. A grant from the Alliant Community Foundation added funding for benches and picnic tables, with an open air picnic shelter to be built when fundraising allows. After a long day of riding, two sturdy 12x12'Priefert pens at each site ensure a good night's sleep for equine and human campers (thank you HHP Farm and Ranch Supply of Dodgeville for your help in making this possible).

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#### New 20- Site Equestrian Campground Now Open at Governor Dodge State Park

The layout of the campground, designed by landscape architecture firm Parkitecture and Planning of Middleton, and built by Rule Construction of Dodgeville, highlights the natural beauty of Governor Dodge State Park with expansive views in all directions. Many mature trees were preserved during construction thanks to "field adjustments" by the skillful Rule Construction crew in collaboration with Parkitecture and Planning engineers. The future landscape will be further enhanced by 100 trees and bushes planted by volunteers in April.





The new campground is already attracting much positive attention from the equestrian community and sites are being reserved for getaways throughout the season. With nearly 30 miles of horse trails traversing the park's 5,000 plus acres of forested hills and valleys, and now a campground that matches the park's scenic beauty, Governor Dodge State Park is poised to become a top Wisconsin riding and camping destination. The Friends of Governor Dodge State Park are truly delighted to offer this "gift to the future," and invite you to visit and explore the many recreational opportunities to be found at this beautiful park. 


#### On the Trail to Treasure at Governor Dodge State Park





#### **Description:**

Level I membership class is available to any individual/family whose interests are similar to those of the Council and is for individuals/families only. Level I and Level II members elect Directors to the WHC Board to represent their District. Family membership is for a family of 2 or more living at the same residence and has 1 vote in the elections and business of their District. Membership must be current to vote at District meetings.

- Programs such as the Certified Judges and Ride Wisconsin require a Level I membership even if you are a Director or a contact person for a Level II or III organization, you will need to be a Level I member yourself to participate in programs.

## Can West Nile viral encephalitis be prevented?


A vaccine is now available for horses. For other species, including humans, limiting exposure to mosquitoes is considered effective prevention. The following actions may reduce the risk of mosquito bites and possible exposure to West Nile virus:

- Check the integrity of screens around your home, porch and patio.
- During warm months, avoid outdoor activities at dusk and dawn.
- If you must be outdoors during hours when mosquitoes are most active, cover up with shoes, socks, long pants and long-sleeved shirts.
- Use mosquito repellant on exposed skin and spray clothing with repellents containing permethrin or DEET (N,N-diethyl-meta-toluamide) since mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing. When using insecticides or insect repellants, be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's directions for use. Products containing DEET should not be sprayed on dogs or cats. Consult your veterinarian about the best ways to protect your pet from exposure.
- Eliminate standing water from any receptacles in which mosquitoes might breed.



#### What is West Nile virus?

West Nile virus is an arbovirus (short for arthropodborne virus) that causes encephalitis (inflammation of the brain). Arboviruses, including West Nile virus, are transmitted by blood-feeding insects such as mosquitoes. Most infections with West Nile virus have been identified in wild birds, horses and humans, but the virus can also infect various other wild and domestic animals.

#### Where did West Nile virus come from?

West Nile virus was first identified in the West Nile district of Uganda in 1937, and has since been found in other parts of Africa, Eastern Europe, West Asia, the Middle East, and the United States. The strain of virus found in the United States most closely resembles that found in the Mediterranean and Middle East.

#### How is West Nile virus transmitted?

Mosquitoes draw the virus from infected birds and transmit it to other animals,



animal to person, person to animal, animal to animal or person to person; however, rare instances of transmission via organ transplantation or blood transfusion have been reported. Ticks infected with the virus have been found in Asia and Africa but there are no verified reports of ticks spreading the virus and their role in transmission has not been determined.

## What is the risk of a person contracting West Nile virus?

The risk of becoming ill from a single mosquito bite is extremely low. In areas where mosquitoes carry the virus, less than 1% are actually infected. Even if mosquitoes are infected, less than 1% of people bitten and infected by those mosquitoes become severely ill.

## What clinical signs are associated with West Nile virus infection?

Humans Most humans infected with the virus are not aware that they have contracted it. If a person does become ill, clinical signs are usually mild and include fever, headache, body aches and, in some cases, skin rash and swollen lymph glands. Signs of more severe infection include high fever, neck stiffness, muscle weakness, convulsions and paralysis. Death rates associated with severe infection range from 3% to 15% and are highest among the elderly.

Horses The most common sign is weakness, usually in the hindquarters. Weakness may be indicated by a widened stance, stumbling, leaning to one side,


and toe dragging. In extreme cases, paralysis may follow. Fever is sometimes evident, as are depression and fearfulness. Approximately 33% of cases of West Nile viral encephalitis in horses proved fatal during the 2001 outbreak in the United States.

Other animals Wild birds infected with West Nile virus in the United States are most often found dead; therefore, descriptions of clinical signs in wild birds are not readily available. Nor have clinical signs associated with West Nile virus infection in dogs, cats, bats, chipmunks, skunks, squirrels, domestic rabbits, and domestic birds been well described. It appears that, although they may be infected, many members of these latter species rarely develop clinical signs of disease.

## How is West Nile viral encephalitis diagnosed and treated?

Diagnosis of West Nile viral encephalitis is based on a history of exposure, clinical signs, and results of diagnostic tests.

As for all viral diseases, treatment consists of providing support (e.g., hospitalization, intravenous fluids, respiratory support, prevention of secondary infections, and good nursing care) while the affected individual's immune system responds to the infection.
